1<sup>st</sup> That the Troops Regular and

of War. The Troops Regular and

mediately on Parade and with the  
Seamen ~~this evening~~<sup>on the 28<sup>th</sup> of April</sup>

That all public Stores ordnance  
and Ordnance Stores be surrendered  
immediately to the Commanding  
Officers of the ~~Army~~<sup>Army</sup> of the United  
States -



that all private property be considered  
sacred and Guaranteed by the Commanding  
Officers of the Army & Navy of the  
United States to the Citizens of the Town  
of York - That the Papers belonging  
to any of the Civil public Officers  
be considered in the same light  
as private property -

That such Surgeons as may be  
procured to attend the Sick & Wounded  
may not be considered  
prisoners of war -

1<sup>st</sup> That the Troops Regular and Militia at this Post and that the Seamen of his Britanic [sic] Majesty at this port be surrendered prisoners of war. The Troops Regular and Militia to ground their arms immediately on Parade and with the Seamen be surrendered immediately.

That all public store ordinance and ordinance stores be surrendered immediately to the Commanding Officer of the Army & Navy of the United States.

that all private property be considered sacred and Guaranteed by the Commanding Officers of the Army & Navy of the United States to the Citizens of the Town of York — That the Papers belonging to any of the Civil public officers be considered in the same light as private property.

That Such Surgeons as may be procured to attend the sick & wounded may not be considered prisoners of War.

The above terms subject to the Ratification or refusal of the Commanding Officers of the Army & Navy.
